Systematic screening for health-related social needs is becoming more deeply rooted in health and human service systems across the country. This holds great promise for health equity advancement since so many health-related social needs have remedies under current law and public policy. Moreover, screening data will reveal population-level needs that can <u>steer communities to systems and policy change</u> <u>strategies that impact structural social dimensions of health (SDOH)</u>.

But screening and referral is the tip of the iceberg -- health workforces have long held many responsibilities that directly impact a person's social, economic and environmental health. So let's make sure team members can carry out those functions successfully! Join us for a conversation about Unlocking Access with national, cross-sector thought leaders who will spotlight key strategies for:

- Making care delivery environments welcoming and inclusive for all;
- Improving engagement with people's requests for medical certifications that *unlock access* to critical social health supports;
- Navigating the tensions inherent in <u>strengths-based communication</u> (and <u>trust-building</u>) with individuals and families, and mandated reporting obligations;
- Rebalancing clinic-based care and community-based care through <u>community</u> <u>health workforce integration and leadership</u>.
