Massachusetts's COVID-19 Eviction & Foreclosure Moratorium Law is set to expire on Oct. 17, 2020.

MA-based tenants at risk for eviction may be eligible for:

**Federal eviction moratorium protection** (in effect through at least 12/31/2020):

- Tenants still can be evicted for reasons other than nonpayment of rent.
- At-risk renters need to meet the requirements spelled out in the CDC notice and sign and share <u>this declaration</u> with their landlord.
- The Declaration has been translated into multiple languages. More information here.
- The protection applies to new and already-filed evictions so long as the tenant completes the declaration.
- If landlords fail to comply with the moratorium, there are criminal penalties enforceable by the Department of Justice.
- Tenants are encouraged to make partial payments to their landlords.

**Rental Relief:** The Commonwealth announced on Monday a <u>COVID-19</u> <u>Eviction Diversion Initiative</u> with supports for both tenants and landlords.

## **Rhode Island**

There is no state-specific eviction moratorium in RI, so the protections offered by the federal moratorium are even more valuable in the Ocean State.

- At-risk RI renters need to meet the requirements noted in the CDC notice and sign and share the <a href="https://example.com/hHC/CDC declaration">HHC/CDC declaration</a> with their landlord.
- Key resources:
  - Limited eviction defense is available through <u>RI Legal Services</u> and the RI Center for Justice.
  - Safe Harbor Housing Program offers tenants a solution outside of the court system by supporting them to create payment plan with their landlord. To apply, tenants or landlords can visit <u>United Way RI's website</u>.
  - HomeSafe rental assistance fund is open and a common application can be found <a href="here">here</a>; this is a one-time grant of financial assistance for families experiencing housing instability.
  - <u>WeR1 program</u> supports those unable to access benefits due to immigration status.
