HUD Issues Notice on Foster Youth to Independence Initiative

Yesterday HUD's Office of Public and Indian Housing (PIH) issued Notice PIH 2020-28 announcing an expansion of the Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) initiative that will create new opportunities for communities to leverage this resource. Through the FYI initiative, HUD will provide housing choice vouchers (HCVs) for youth eligible under the Family Unification Program (FUP), subject to availability. This allocation of vouchers is funded through a \$10 million setaside in the 2020 Appropriations Act.

The notice, which supersedes Notice <u>PIH 2019-20 (HA)</u>, explains the eligibility and application requirements for FYI voucher funding, and how applications will be processed. According to a <u>press release</u> issued by HUD yesterday, the new notice makes several changes that aim to increase participation in the FYI Initiative, including:

- Opens the opportunity to request vouchers to every PHA that administers an HCV program, including those PHAs that have a 90 percent utilization rate of their FUP program.
- Increases the maximum award to a maximum cap of 50 vouchers per fiscal year for those PHAs that have an FYI voucher utilization rate of 90 percent or greater.
- Recognizes the importance of community partners by encouraging partnerships with state, local, philanthropic, or faith-based organizations as well as Continuum or Cares (CoCs).
- Allows PHAs to request funding on a rolling basis to the extent funding remains available.

Since the initiative was launched in June of 2019, 31 states and 91 PHAs have received FYI funding, for a total of 844 vouchers and over \$6.8 million in funds to prevent or end homelessness among young adults under the age of 25 who are leaving, or have recently left, the foster care system. Since the first round of awards in October of 2019, the FYI program has expanded by 25 states.

HUD Awards \$4 Million in Veteran Housing Rehab Grants

In a press release yesterday, HUD announced that it is awarding \$3.9 million to four communities

to assist disabled veterans with modifying or rehabilitating their homes, making them more accessible. The funding was awarded through the <u>Veterans Housing Rehabilitation and</u> <u>Modification Pilot Program</u> (VHRMP). Grantees will make necessary physical modifications to address the needs of eligible veterans, including wheelchair ramps, widening doors, reconfiguring bathrooms, and modifying homes to accommodate a veteran's caregiver.
