

Philip F. Mangano, President and CEO
The American Round Table to Abolish Homelessness

In 2002, Philip F. Mangano was appointed by President George W. Bush as Executive Director of the White House United States Interagency Council on Homelessness. Mr. Mangano shaped and led the national strategy to end homelessness from 2002-2009, including in the early Obama Administration. He defined the economic case for ending homelessness through the application of cost benefit analysis and business planning. The nation's first documented decreases in homelessness were achieved during his federal tenure.

Mangano travelled more than one million miles, delivered more than 1,000 speeches and established an unprecedented national partnership of 20 Federal agencies, 53 Governors of States and Territories, and over 1,500 Mayors and County Executives partnered in over 350 local jurisdictional Ten Year Plans to End Homelessness. The new national partnership was recognized and supported by the U.S. Conference of Mayors, National League of Cities, National Association of Counties, National Governors Association, and International Downtown Association.

In 2009, Mangano founded the American Round Table to Abolish Homelessness where he is President and CEO, partnering with jurisdictional leaders across the nation to upgrade their strategic response to homelessness. Mangano was the founding Executive Director of the Massachusetts Housing and Shelter Alliance (1990 – 2002).
