More than 80 000 women joined the labour market (2019)


ELDEQ shows the positive effects of the attendance of a quality educative service on the development of children

For every 100 \$ invested in the subsidized network, 175 \$ net in taxation revenues (20 \$ for Quebec and 55 \$ for Ottawa) (2013)







Network of early childhood educative services in Quebec – March 31, 2021

25 years of experimentation – the main lessons learned



The CPE model gives a **central place to the parents** on the boards of directors, thus ensuring a better monitoring of the educative mission.

The experience of Quebec has shown that when we **subsidize** the educative services, we ensure a **better distribution of places** on the territory according to the needs of the families.

The **subsidized daycares** in Quebec **offer better quality** services, because of the better operating conditions offered to the educators, among other reasons. The **lucrative purpose** of certain types of early childhood educative services **does not seem to be consistent with the objectives of quality** besides weakening the sustainability of the service for the families.

Lots of work remains for **acquiring and recognizing the knowledge** on the importance of the first years in the life of the children and the positive impacts of quality educative environnements provided to yound children.

> Even if the scientific conclusions are clear about the positive effects on the participation of women in the labour market and on the development of children, **lots of work remains to make sure this is seen as an investment, not an expanditure**.
