Defining OER

Open Educational Resources are teaching, learning, and research materials in any medium – digital or otherwise – that reside in the public domain or have been released under an open license that permits no-cost access, use, adaptation, and redistribution by others with no (or limited) restrictions.

Zero Cost ≠ **OER**

What is not OER?

The following "free" examples are not considered OER:

- Library resources still bound by copyright
- TED Talks (as they have a no derivative license)
- 'OER-based' resources that are mixed with copyrighted resources
- Items found online on the web

* OER is FREE + permissions



"How does OER influence student choices?"


65% of students said that they had decided against buying a textbook because it was too expensive.



Students enrolled in courses where OER materials were used took more courses in the semester if they used OER and the following semester after the use of OER.



Student spending on materials








OER usage continues to increase

How do faculty choose OER content?

- Write their own with or without grant \$\$
- Search for a quality OER text already written
- Customize existing OER content they have found
- Aggregate OER content from various sources





Most important to faculty when considering OER?

- Affordability (57%)
- **Quality (51%)**
- Increased Engagement (50%)
- Enhanced Outcomes (39%)



There are challenges with OER adoption:

Time to transition

Can't find quality content

Can't find relevant content

- ✓ Reputation
- Customization
- ✓ Enhancement
- ✓ Support











Find Reputable Content Providers

- How are they funded?
- Are they committed to peer review?
- Are they affiliated with a reputable institution?
- Check for 3rd party reviews and endorsements



Think about Customization

Customize OER books

- Cut, add, delete
- Re-arrange
- Include videos and hyperlinks

Aggregate OER content from various sources

- Unique courses, upper-level, specialized courses
- Specific methodology for course
- Personal preference
- No comprehensive textbooks available
