

In Person

People who can physically access the library when the class is offered.

Commutable, immediate community

Need not be computer literate

Internet/ device not required

COVID may limit participation



Virtual

People who are available when the class is offered. Potentially worldwide Some computer literacy required Access to internet/ device required No COVID concerns



Weekdays, Daytime Retired Unemployed College students Homemakers, Stay-at-home parents People who work nontraditional hours Everyone <u>except</u> the 9 to 5 crowd



Conversation Group

Advantages of One-on-One Lessons

In person or virtual

Personalized instruction

Students of all levels

Relationship between teacher and student

Relatively rare, intensely desirable





Disadvantages of One-on-One Lessons

- Requires (a lot of) preparation
- Requires (a high level of) subject knowledge
- Teaching experience is very helpful
- Only teaching l person (or maybe 2) at a time
- Must manage a waiting list
- Must deal with attendance issues



Significant behind the scenes program management

Advantages of Conversation Group: Staffing

Low investment way to get started

Minimal human resources and physical supplies

Requires little or no preparation

Experienced teacher not required

Train staff & qualified volunteers to facilitate

Easy to shop the competition

Social and fun



Advantages of Conversation Group: Attendance

Can be in person or virtual (or hybrid)

Theoretically unlimited attendance

Potentially worldwide audience

No registration, wait list, or attendance issues

Social and fun



Advantages of Conversation Group: Part of a larger program

Test the waters for interest in an expanded ESL program

Can be part of a larger program or lesson plan Serves the wait list, gets people involved Students need speaking practice

Social and fun



Disadvantages of Conversation Group:

Limited personalized attention

Less accessible to beginners

Difficult for students who lack confidence

Conversations can come off the rails (or fizzle and die)

Not really a "class"



Let's Crunch Some Numbers Return on time investment

You have 2 hours per week to dedicate to ESL...

How to invest your time?

One-on-one lessons

or

Conversation group



Let's Crunch Some Numbers Return on time investment


Option I. Three individual lessons @ 30-minutes each. 30 minutes prep & management Attendance total = 3

Option 2. Two conversation groups @ 1 hour each. Negligible preparation time Attendance total = 20+

Getting Started with Conversation Who's the facilitator?

Conversation group does not necessarily need a "teacher".

Native or fluent speaker

Can answer grammar questions or refer students to relevant resources.



Getting Started with Conversation The role of the facilitator


Leads the discussion

Keeps students on topic Diffuses confrontations Identifies a teachable moment

What are we going to talk about? Conversation Topics to Avoid



How a conversation comes off the rails.

What are we going to talk about? Get the conversation rolling.

- Confidence!
- A positive spin
- Who's first? Maybe you are!
- Participation can develop.



What are we going to talk about? Filling dead air

Ask open ended questions.

Summarize what the speaker said.

Discuss new vocabulary.

Introduce idioms.

Share your own experience.



A great conversation begins with you!



Get your students invested.




Keep typing.
