- 7:00 a.m. Board your washroom equipped, climate controlled highway motor coach and depart for Ottawa via Highway #407. En route, your Tour Leader will get to know the students on a first name basis.
- 12:30 p.m. Lunch
- 2:00 p.m. Indigenous Focused Tour of the Canadian Museum of History. Your guided tour will include two of the Museum's three permanent exhibitions. Explore Indigenous heritage in the Grand Hall which focuses on Indigenous Peoples of the Pacific Coast, the First Peoples Hall, which celebrates the history, diversity, creativity and resourcefulness of First Nations, Inuit and Métis, or the Canadian History Hall, where Indigenous stories are integral to a national narrative spanning 15,000 years.

- 8:00 p.m. Indigenous Discovery Walking Tour. Highlights include the National Aboriginal Veterans Monument that commemorates the contributions of Indigenous veterans in war and peacekeeping operations. The Land Marker Monument which acknowledges Ottawa is located on unceded Algonquin Territory. The Lost Child, a directional marker that represents guidance and The Canadian Tribute to Human Rights, the world's first monument dedicated to universal human rights.

DAY 2

- 10:00 a.m. Guided Tour of the National Gallery of Canada. One of the architectural jewels of Ottawa, the National Gallery of Canada's Collection of Indigenous Art includes First Nations, Métis, and Inuit artworks, with an emphasis on contemporary art from 1980 to the present day. View works by some of the best-known Indigenous artists in Canada including Carl Beam, Brian Jungen, Faye HeavyShield, Shelley Niro, Jeffrey Thomas, and Lawrence Paul Yuxweluptun and more!
- 11:30 a.m. Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival. Enjoy lunch at your own cost in the Culinary Arts Pavilion at the Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival. Students will have the opportunity to meet Indigenous chefs, enjoy live cooking demonstrations and purchase taster-sized portions of Indigenous foods. Alternatively, students can visit the many food vendors located on the festival grounds.

- 12:00 p.m. International Competition Pow Wow. The Summer Solstice International Competition Pow Wow attracts some of the best singers and dancers from across North America each year with over 192 dancers and 31 drum groups. The competition is set to the powerful heartbeat of the drum as dancers adorned in stunning regalia share their culture and heritage with Pow Wow attendees. Students will have the opportunity to embrace traditions of the past and witness the inspiration of future generations through this performance.
- 1:30 p.m. Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival. Explore the grounds and discover a marketplace where you can purchase Indigenous made crafts and fashions; watch Chef Mystery Box cooking competitions, art workshops, Elder teachings, cultural performances and more.
- 5:30 p.m. Dinner
- 7:00 p.m. Live Music at the Summer Solstice Indigenous Festival. Enjoy live evening performances from both emerging artists and well-established musicians within the Canadian landscape. The talented Indigenous artists have each created a unique sound that honours their culture and resonates with audiences across the world.

- 10:00 a.m. Ottawa River Cycling Tour. Grab your helmets and follow your guide as you bike along the Ottawa River. This fun outdoor adventure runs rain or shine and allows students to see a different side of Major's Hill Park, Alexandra Bridge, Portage Bridge, Victoria Island and the Main Locks.
