On Tuesday, Oklahoma Governor, Kevin Stitt (R), signed into law <u>HB 2367</u>, the workers' comp reform bill. Among

Delaware is poised to be the 26th state to mandate the use of electronic prescribing. HB 115, which is now before the

Governor for signature, mandates that all dentists, podiatrists, doctors, nurses, and optometrists utilize electronic prescribing for all prescriptions issued in Delaware beginning January 1, 2021.

that when an immediate-release opioid drug is prescribed for acute pain, the prescription is limited to the shortest period that is possible to treat the injury. The bill also requires that prescribers consider alternatives to Schedule II controlled substances or other opioid drugs before issuing an initial prescription of a Schedule II or opioid drug.



Governor John Bel Edwards (D) signed into law SB 107 on June 5. The **bill** adds PTSD to the list of presumed illness

compensable under the workers' comp statute for local and state police officers, paid and volunteer firefighters, and EMT personnel. The bill takes effect August 1, 2019.

VCF was established after the September 11th terrorist attack to help pay for medical and economic losses experienced by first responders who worked at the attack sites.

Arizona

The Industrial Commission of Arizona has released **proposed** rules on the Physician and Pharmacy proposal limits reimbursement for repackaged medications to the original NDC and limits the reimbursement amounts for physician dispensed medications. A hearing is scheduled on July 1, 2019.
