The Family Leadership in Language and Learning Center (FL3) has developed a new resource for families on the topic of early intervention directed towards parents that can be used by professionals and family-to-family support programs. This resource was developed as a result of insights from providers who engage with families who may not or do not choose to enroll in early intervention services and to explore further understanding of these families compared to families in the past. Results from a 2019 Roundtable discussion at the Western Regional Early Intervention Conference with almost 30 representatives from eight states provided input on this unique population. In addition, the FL3 Center has been collecting parent and professional input during stay-at-home orders. As a result of this information, a new resource has been developed for families to show the positives of early intervention. The "8 Reasons" infographic can serve as an important tool, now more than ever in supporting families understanding the importance of Early Intervention. In considering some of the barriers that have been a result of the pandemic, the presenters will highlight important messages that can be conveyed to families.

An occupational therapist by training, Sara has worked for Hands & Voices since 2001, currently serving as the Colorado chapter director and the editor for the quarterly newspaper, *The Communicator* for Hands & Voices. Sara has a special interest in advocating for hearing screening in the homebirth community. She chairs the Colorado Infant Hearing Advisory Committee, and was a coauthor for the handbook Bridge to Preschool:

Navigating a Successful Transition as well as articles and presentations on telehealth, promoting self-advocacy, progressive hearing loss, and the decision process regarding cochlear implants. She finds parenting young adults and teens to be an even bigger challenge.
